Plumstead Township Parks

As of June 26, 2020, all township parks re-opened to the public and organized groups under green phase restrictions set by the state guidelines. Signs have been posted in many areas throughout the parks promoting some of the guidelines to help everyone be aware of current recommendations. Please enjoy your time in our parks and be safe!

Landis Park

4060 Gregory Drive (in the Landis Greene development)

3700 Miriam Drive (parking lot location)

Landis Park has something for just about everyone. This park has a 1.25-mile paved bike/walking path taking you throughout the park open areas and wooded area with two access points off Gregory Drive and one from the parking area on Miriam Drive.

On the paved walking/bike trail leading from the parking lot you will find a Born Learning Trail. The colorful signs and markings on the trail are designed to create early learning opportunities by providing interactive prompts for small children and their parents/caregivers.

Now that you are in the park you will notice the sign bed area and retaining wall that was installed at the direction of a local Boy Scout for his Eagle Scout project. Next you will see a 20'x40' pavilion with picnic tables. Close by to the pavilion we offer a tot lot and swing set area for children up to 12 years old. We also have a basketball court and an open hard court in this area. Farther into the open area of the park there are two regulation 60' baseball fields.

This park is also the home of a retention basin that allows for flooding during the winter to be used as an ice-skating rink. One half of the basin is available for leisure skating while the other half is available for ice hockey. During the winter months, green and red flag conditions will be posted on site and on the township website. Organizations and individuals can reserve the pavilion (with or without electricity), baseball field and basketball/hard court areas.

In the back corner of the parking lot you can find the township leaf compost bin. This program which allows township residents to pick up free leaf compost (when available) was developed by the township EAC committee. I hope you enjoyed this quick overview of Landis Park and can visit this and all the township parks!



Parks Policies

1. Park hours are sunrise to sunset (unless posted otherwise).
2. Some of the parks do not have comfort facilities available.
3. Smoking & Alcohol are prohibited.
4. Parks are Carry In Carry Out (Please take your trash with you and properly dispose of it. This includes dog waste, please do not leave your bag laying along the trail for others to dispose of.)
5. Motorized vehicles are only permitted in designated parking areas.
6. Golf is not permitted in township parks.
7. Fireworks are not permitted in township parks.
8. All areas are open to the citizens and general public on a first come, first serve basis unless reserved with Facility Use Form.
9. Organized group gatherings require completion of a Facility Use Form. Forms may be obtained from the Public Works office by calling (215) 766-0189 between 7:30 am and 4:00 pm daily.

Officers will be at each location for 20 – 25 minutes, ready to pick up your unwanted prescriptions.

Water Customer After Hours Emergency Contact Information

In the event of a water supply quality or maintenance issue (Plumstead Township is only responsible for the meter inside your home) we remind you and ask that you call the Plumstead Township Police Department NON-EMERGENCY phone number: 215-766-8740. This number is for after normal business hours, weekends, and holidays.

Identify yourself as a Plumstead Township water customer and ask that the dispatcher to request the officer to call the on duty public works personnel.

Please provide your name, address, and phone number so that follow up on your concern can be completed.

During normal business hours, please call Public Works at 215-766-0189 for billing, service, and maintenance needs.

DUMPING REMINDER: Just a gentle reminder dumping is NOT permitted in the township parks (Ord 2003-07). Pictured is the illegal dumping in the Landis Green Development. If you see anyone illegally dumping please reach out to the non-emergency police number (215) 766-8740, or our Public Works Department (215) 766-0189.

ANNUAL WATER QUALITY REPORT NOTICE REMINDER

Plumstead Township is required to complete an annual Consumer Confidence Report for all water system customers. The report gives basic information on the system and test results. The reports will be available online at the township website: www.plumstead.org by July 1. Click on the WATER DEPARTMENT tab and then the forms and documents tab. The reports are listed by system under 2013 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report. Printed copies can be mailed upon request by calling the Public Works office at 215-766-0189.



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Roadside Tree Responsibility

While the focus over the past several years, and moving forward, continues to be the demise of so many emerald ash trees, there are continual concerns regarding the health and safety of all type species of trees that are within the proximity of falling into the travelled portion of our local roads.

As a reminder to all residents, the maintenance and care of trees along township roads, even though located within the right-of-way, are the responsibility of the individual property owner.

Trees should be monitored along your property road frontage and special attention should be given to dead and dying trees with regard to safety to motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians.

Residents in developments are responsible for trimming of trees that overhang sidewalks for the safety of pedestrians.

Plumstead Township Open Space

Open space is any open piece of land that is undeveloped having no buildings or other built structures of any type. It is meant to be left as “green” space land covered with grass, trees, shrubs, or other vegetation.

The original intent of the Board of Supervisors when the option came up in the development process in the early 1990’s was to retain these expanses of land (small or large) as a remaining portion of what once was in most cases farmland.

Protected open space provides value through naturally occurring environmental processes. Some areas are stormwater management areas for the rain/snow melt run off from the development homes and paved streets. These specific areas are ultimately governed by the guidelines and regulations of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. In relying on the natural features of protected open spaces to provide valuable services such as ground water recharge and water quality protection, flood protection, and provision of natural wildlife habitat. The return on the environmental benefit is fundamentally large.

Primarily, the soil of these open spaces absorbs rain/snow melt water, replenishing streams, reservoirs, and aquifers. Since the major portions of developed areas in the township receive public water, this water is supplied by wells drilled in the ground around the development the open space is located. This natural system provides for the continuous recharge. Were this ecosystem service to fail, water would have to be imported from elsewhere, or local water would have to be more extensively treated.

The intent of the open space is not to provide a “larger back yard” for those who abut the property. If treated as private property, owned, and managed by another, as a neighbor, that property not owned by you should be respected. Over the past several years, management strategies have changed about the annual cutting of the areas. These decisions were made based on both environmental and fiscal management concerns.

Additionally, the township open space area is not there to be expanded upon by placing gardens, planting trees or other vegetation, dumping waste, or storing personal items. We continue to monitor these areas and notify residents on a case-by-case basis.

If your property adjoins township open space, please do not “take it as your own”. We ask that it be respected for how it is managed. This management is diverse depending on location. In the end though, it is not yours for the taking and we would ask that you respect it as such.

Examples of open space violations include cutting/mowing of grass areas, dumping of debris and/or storing of debris, installation of a gardens, flowers beds and plantings including trees and shrubbery. Installation of any structure such as sheds, swing sets, horseshoe pits and play structures.

Census 2020:

The 2020 Census counts every person living in the United States and five US territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands, Guam & the US Virgin Islands).

The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the US Census Bureau (a nonpartisan government agency), once every ten years.

The census provided critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers and many others use to provide daily services, products and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads and other resources based on census data.

The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the US House of Representatives.

The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time the country has counted its population since 1790.

Please keep in mind that participating in the census is required by law. With about 4 in 10 households having yet to respond to the census, the Bureau announced they have begun making follow-up calls to some households. If after the mailing and the calls if you still have not responded, the Census takers may visit a household to conduct a short interview.

Please take a minute to fill out the census survey, again this will help your community.

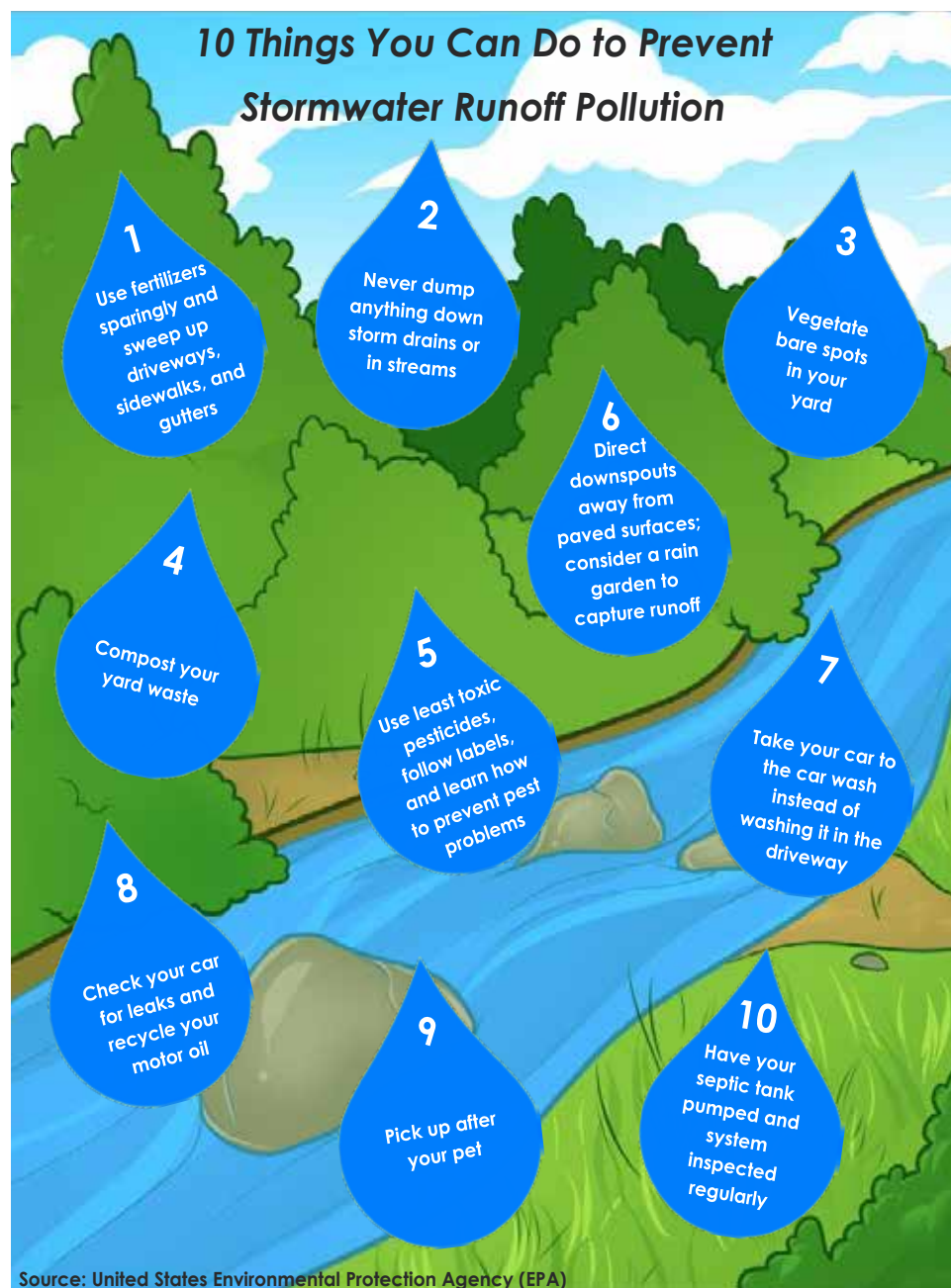

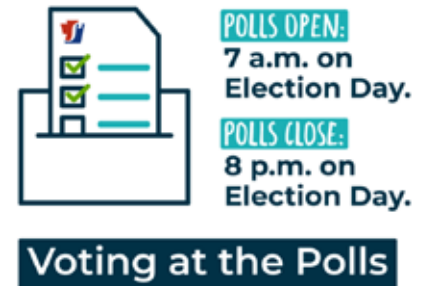
Practice Good Citizenship

The rules change as more is learned about this new virus, COVID-19. Here is what science and the Governor say:

**PLEASE Practice good public health and citizenship.
You wearing your mask protects others.**

1. Wear your mask when you get too close to others while outside and always while indoors, unless you are with your family.
2. Stay at least 6 feet away from others, the further the better.
3. Wash your hands a lot and don't touch your face, especially after touching surfaces.
4. Wash surfaces to protect others too.

Some have said that COVID-19 is just like seasonal influenza. IT IS NOT. Many people globally have built up immunity to the flu, but because this COVID-19 virus is new, **no one has immunity**. That means more people will suffer severe disease. Globally, between 3 and 4 times the number of people who get COVID-19 have died compared to the flu. It is serious.

Smoke Alarms at Home



SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.

SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- ! A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- ! Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- ! Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
