BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ESTABLISHES THE LAND PRESERVATION, EDUCATION AND ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Plumstead Township Board of Supervisors (BOS) established the Land Preservation, Education and Advisory Committee (LPEAC) to spearhead township land preservation efforts and make recommendations to the BOS on land preservation applications.

At their January 3rd reorganization meeting the BOS appointed the following to the new committee: Brian Trymbiski, chair, Michael May, vice chair, James Stark, secretary, and Tom Lurz, Gary Talbot, Kimberly Troup and Chance Worthington, members at large. Supervisor Ken Lichtenstein will serve as board liaison and Township Manager Angela Benner will serve as staff liaison.

Among the LPEAC's tasks will be spreading the word about the importance and benefits of land preservation including the various preservation methods available to property owners; identifying property of special value; determining preservation funding sources; and working with qualified landowners to assist in the preservation of their property.

Over the years, land preservation has been an invaluable tool to help manage development and protect Plumstead's rural character. Thanks to strong township support, today over 4,300 acres of agricultural lands, open space and parks in Plumstead Township have been permanently preserved. The goal of the LPEAC is to encourage continued land preservation awareness and activity.

PLUMSTEADVILLE VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY RECEIVES \$1.7 MILLION GRANT!

Great headline, isn't it? We are truly grateful to receive this award, however, receipt of the money is much more complicated than the headline. This grant requires matching funds from the Fire Company. Therefore, we the Fire Company must pay out \$1.7 million in order to get the \$1.7 million from the state. Therefore, we still need to hold fundraisers and receive donations.

First, there is a catch. There is no such thing as free money. PVFC will not receive a check for \$1.7 million for building renovations or to use as we need. We must apply three separate times to have specific project costs approved. We have already passed the first two application phases (screenings). The submission for final approval must be submitted by April 26, 2023.

Second, the soonest we can apply for reimbursement for our expenses will be when the state approves the final project application, estimated as December 2023, at the earliest. Yes, you read that right, reimbursement. First, we must spend the money in order to be reimbursed by this state grant. There is no big fat deposit coming to our bank account, for us to spend.


The grant cannot reimburse more than 50% of the project costs. The first 50% is called our match, our good faith effort that the project is necessary and that we have been diligent in raising the funds. PVFC does not have \$1.7 million sitting around to qualify as our portion of the match. However, we have qualified for \$928,000 in USDA mortgage financing, which will count as part of our portion of the match.

In addition to replacing Station 20 at Easton and Ferry roads, renovating Station 24 on Stump Road (built in 1935), we have needed to purchase two new fire trucks which are expected to be delivered in June 2023 for \$1.2 million. While we wish this expense was not necessary, we are replacing two fire trucks that are 31 and 24 years old and cost tens of thousands each a year to maintain. They are running on their last legs, and like an old car, it is costing us more to keep them on the road than it is to replace them.



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PUBLIC WORKS

DEAD OR HAZARDOUS TREES IN TOWNSHIP OWNED OPEN SPACE



It has been the Township's policy for the past several years to remove standing, hazardous trees, getting the tree to the ground safely to deteriorate.

The Township does not cut up and chip or remove the trees.

In the past three years we have taken over 500 trees (mainly white ash and oak trees, all diseased).

Having those trees cut up, chipped and removed, would be a significant cost estimated at least \$100,000 annually.

Work has been completed across township in or near almost every development. This open space was set aside at the time the development was approved in an effort to maintain a small area of natural state.

Staff is charged with the management of these areas on behalf of all tax paying residents.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM

In effort to reduce the amount of natural waste that enters our landfills, a policy was adopted by the Board of Supervisors in 2001 that allows residents to participate in a yard waste recycling program offered by the township. Yard waste consists of tree branches and limbs only.

Yard waste will be collected on a monthly basis during February – May and September – November. Please keep in mind that the collections in October & November may be delayed since leaf pick-up coincides with the yard waste collection.

The program is designed to accommodate small yard waste. The program is not to be utilized for large scale clearing and tree removal. Mixed up, complicated piles and piles that require cutting will not be collected. Nor will hard wood be taken.

Large scale storms that overwhelm the area causing significant damage will be address on a case by case basis at the discretion of the Board of Supervisors. As we learned following the

October 2021 snowstorm, the volume generated could not be practically handled by the Township staff while still conducting normal daily operations.

IMPORTANT SPECIFICATIONS:

Yard waste shall be placed in neat piles at the edge of the road, near your driveway. Limb size is restricted to 6' foot lengths no greater that 5" in diameter. Piles are to be stacked with the cut edge facing the road. Piles must be less that 2' in height and 2' in width. No more than 10 piles will be accepted at one time. Piles not meeting these specifications will be refused for collection at the discretion of the on-site Crew Foremen.

Grass clippings, leaves, trash, rocks, dirt, plants or bushes with dirt and root ball intact WILL NOT be accepted. These items should be composted within your property or arrangements should be made with a subcontractor to properly dispose of these items.

You must call Public Works at 215-766-0189 and register to have your yards waste collected. Yard waste is to be placed curbside by 7:00 AM on the Monday of the scheduled pick-up. Pick-up will be based on citizen response, weather conditions and scheduling within the Public Works Department.



Road Work

The Board of Supervisors, as part of the approved 2023 budget, approved over \$1 million dollars in funding for the following road repair projects in 2023.

Public Works crews will do all necessary preparation work ahead of any contracted work.

Funding will cover the following:

- Paving of Meetinghouse Road between Curly Hill Road and Stump Road
- · Paving of Poplar Lane at Curly Hill Road
- Micro-surface paving of all streets in the Durham Ridge development
- Rubberized asphalt crack sealing in Fox Hunt, Summer Hill, and Estates of Brookside
- Bituminous sealcoat application on McNeil, Ridgeview, Twin Silo, Covered Bridge, Schlentz Hill, Shad and Rodgers Roads

PLEASE NO DUMPING IN THE BASINS!

Just a gentle reminder.. Plumstead Township is asking for your help. Please no dumping of any kind in our basins!

Naturalized basins are NOT the same as a compost site. The dumping of yard waste could enable the growth of invasive plants and it will be costly to the Township to remove the invasive plant materials.

Just a reminder, all dogs three months or older must be licensed in the state of PA each year. You can purchase an annual or lifetime license.

All dogs and nonferal cats, three months of age or older must be vaccinated against rabies. Violators can be cited with a minimum fine of \$300 per violation plus court costs.

The main thrust of the presentation was to profile some Plumstead veterans. We asked those Plumstead veterans that we know of three questions:


- Tell us about your service history

The last part of the celebration was an excellent breakfast made by volunteers from Living Hope Community Church.








Water Meter Replacement Program

The Township is continuing a project to replace more than 1,500 older residential water meters with a new generation of remotely-read digital units. The replacement program will take place over the next several years and consist of replacing meters in homes built in the mid to late 1990's and early 2000's.

The replacement program will consist of replacing about 200 meters per year during the summer months.

Over time water meters wear out and their accuracy declines. The new meters, built by Neptune Technology Group in Tallassee, AL – include an extended-life





The 2023 replacement program will complete the Cabin Run development. We will also work to replace meters in Plumstead Woods and a portion of the Landis Greene development.

Approximately 200 meters will be replaced beginning on or around June 19, 2023 and concluding August 18, 2023.

- The first notification will be sent out on or around June 1.
- The second notification will be sent out on or around July 3.
- The third notification will be sent out on or around August 1.
- Customers who do not schedule an appointment to have the work completed by August 18 will be posted with a service termination notice.

Water System Notes

Calls come in to the Public Works office from time to time regarding water quality concerns and excess use issues.

Potable water is provided to customers from ground water wells across the township. Most notable is the high, naturally occurring, mineral content (hardness) that can cause a light discoloration and sediment build up. The township addresses this concern by flushing the system through fire hydrants at least annually.

From time to time, we receive calls about "cloudy" water. In most all cases, this is simply air in the water. If you fill a clear glass from your tap and see cloudiness, let the glass sit for several minutes and the air will dissipate. You will know it was air even if you were to take a spoon and quickly stir the water in the glass. The water should remain clear. Air can enter the home plumbing through malfunctioning equipment or leaks.

In almost every situation, when we receive a call regarding low or no pressure, it is likely caused by something within the

home. In rare cases such as a fire, or in extreme, a main break, a whole house filter, specialized water treatment equipment, or a malfunctioning water softener is the likely cause.

Each of these appliances requires some level of service on a regular basis. Malfunctions include filters not being changed at regular intervals and are a common cause for quality issues and excessive use.

A malfunctioning water softener that was installed and had never been serviced was the recent cause for an extremely high water bill. Thousands of gallons of water went "down the drain" and had to be paid for by the customer. Please consult owner's manuals and reputable service companies for more information on the proper management of these appliances. Adding salt and allowing the unit to automatically backwash are not the only things that need to be done to a water softener.


Finally, you can check your water usage by simply monitoring the water meter in your home. At a quiet time when no use is occurring, stand at your water meter. The numbers/dial should not be moving. If it is, you may have a toilet leaking

or other appliance allowing water to flow freely. You can read your own meter on a daily, weekly or monthly basis and calculate your usage to see if you believe it to be within a normal range.

The graphic at right is an example of how quickly loss can add up.

We have a responsibility to provide clean, safe water, and we do. While we cannot offer specific advice, we hope that these few general topics will be seriously considered as a part of your normal home maintenance and care.
